
Dave Campbell has nominated for the Secretaries position, which will be put to the vote at the General Meeting. Thanks Dave.








#### DAY TIME MEETING



#### HSV7 TRANSMITTER SITE VISIT

On Thursday morning the 29<sup>th</sup> of April, a group of around ten Club members visited the HSV7 television transmitter site at the top of Mt. Dandenong. We were met by Sean Senior, one of the technical staff, who had worked with the company for 19 years. Sean spent some time taking us around the installation, We inspected the transmitters, combiners, uplink console, digital TV trial and backup generator plants.

Sean has a novice call for some time but has not yet upgraded to the full license. This would be a mere formality as he also holds a Broadcast Operators certificate (BOCP) which gives him an exemption for the AOCP exam.

The installation has multiple levels of redundancy at every stage, so if there are major or minor interruptions caused by lightning strikes or hardware faults, there would only ever be a few seconds of down time before a backup system returned the signal to air. There is even multiple site redundancy, so that if the tower fell over, or some other really nasty event occurred, the HSV7 signal can be sent from one of the other TV transmitter sites up the mountain.

Many thanks to both Sean and the HSV7 management for allowing us to take a peek at the 'other side' of the screen. It is fair to say that we take for granted that a picture will always divinely appear when we hit the 'go' button on our TV remote, without really thinking about how it actually gets there.



### THE DATA SIDE OF RADIO

OK so you've got a computer with Windows running on it but do you know how to use its features. It's not easy to find out about the powerful items in Windows; however there are a few. Lets see if I can think of some of them. EXPLORER. If you don't know what Explorer is then you either haven't had a PC for long or need to play with it more. Anyway did you know that when you drag an item or items to another directory, if you hold down the SHIFT key at the same time, it will force the item to be moved instead of copied. And if you hold down the CTRL key at the same time, it will force the item to be copied instead of moved. If you see the item being dragged with a + sign attached, this means it will be copied. If you see the item being dragged without the + sign attached, it will be moved. Also to select a range of items to be dragged, highlight the first item in the list then move to the last item to be selected and hold down the SHIFT key while clicking on that item. You will now see the whole range of items highlighted. If you don't want one or more of the items selected to be dragged, hold down the CTRL key while clicking on each of the unwanted items and you will see that the others remain highlighted. This works also if you want to select individual items.

#### Using the WINDOWS key

You can use the following keyboard shortcuts with a Microsoft Natural Keyboard or any other compatible keyboard that includes the Windows logo key.


If you want to delete an item immediately without placing it in the Recycle Bin, hold down the SHIFT key then click DELETE.

Switch to another window by holding down ALT while repeatedly pressing TAB.

INTERNET If you spend any time on the Net, install ICO and you will be able to tell if your friends are connected at the same time. Then you can chat to each other, send files etc. This program has become so popular that it is almost part of the operating system now.

<u>FAX Programs</u> There are many around other than the Microsoft offering. I use one called Winfax. Easy to use, has an answering machine built in, you can get your faxes remotely easily and you can send or receive data files as attachments. This makes it a good allrounder
