Club Elections...




PUB NIGHT






TS120 10-80m 100w PEP, circa 1975 value is approx. \$400



TM701 2m/70cm mobile FM 35W, circa 1990 approx value \$500
















TK300 Crystal locked Commercial hand held

MORE MODIFICATIONS TO RT85 - Paul VK3TGX

Recently when trying to finally get my RT85 on air, I observed the noise on tx audio fault that has been the subject of previous mods from Ian, (my rig was totally unmodified) However I didn't like cutting the ribbon cable as that meant 2 cords running from the rig to the head, a bit messy I thought. So 1 prodded around in the head and found that putting a 100nf capacitor from pin 6 to pin 4 of U7, LF351 op amp provided a 90% plus fix to that problem.

Subjectively it seemed to work a bit better that Graeme VK3XTA's rig that has had U7 removed and the ribbon cut to include some shielded audio cable.

Another mod tried by Ian was to connect the mic directly to the rig bypassing the head altogether. This seems to have the same level of success, however PTT control is read by the micro processor from the head - the PTT line from a directly connected mic has to be routed back up the ribbon cable to the remote head! (there are spare wires)

Later on I plan to completely replace the ribbon cable with some shielded data cable, earthed directly to the rig and the head case to provide maximum shielding. This should servery reduce the crud radiated into other rigs in one's shack.

Another quick mod would be to fit some large ferrite beads to the power cable, etc to try and stop any crud at these points.

SWICH MODE POWER SUPPLY PROJECT - Paul VK3TGX

Several months ago I was asked to look into modifying an PC power supply to provide 13.8V to run radio gear etc. Ian sourced a cheap power supply from Rockby electronics, this unit was duly modified and you could squeeze 20A out of it. However the rectifier I had fitted was quickly overheating, not due to it being under rated, rather due to a lack of heat sinking provided in the supply. So I started looking for a diode pack with a lower voltage drop. (ie less heat) A friend of mine offered up a few samples to try (he said they were better) so in went the first and -B-A-N-G- went the power supply!!

I was after a 3 leg double diode packs, one of his was a 3 leg 1 diode unit! This effectively shorted out the centre tapped transformer!

I have found some better devices from Sanyo (90V 40A schottky) on the Internet however I have yet to find a supplier.

Even if I do, I still have to find replacements for the 2 vaporised transistors in the power supply - thanks Peter.

AUSTRALIA MOVING TO DROP MORSE CODE

The WIA has been actively considering for the past six weeks the issue of reducing the maximum Morse code licence test speed in Australia to 5wpm.

It is likely to be discussing the matter in detail next month with the Australian Communications Authority (ACA), the radio administration.

The seven state-based Divisions of the WIA which form the policy making WIA Federal Council are about to vote on a new policy through a postal motion. That motion is in support of lowering the Morse code test speed for full access to the HF bands from 10wpm to 5wpm.

The WIA Divisions which have clearly declared support for lowering the speed are in order of announcing their decision VK3, VK6, VK5, and VK1. While VK2 and VK4 also appear to be in agreement. The motion needs a majority vote of four.

VK7 Division structure includes three internal branches. Two are reported in favour of a reduction to 5wpm, and the third is due to meet today. The VK7 State Council will then cast its vote in the WIA Federal Council.

The WIA also expects the general issue of Morse code licence requirements to be debated at the IARU Region 3 conference hosted by the WIA later this year.

Join the worldwide fight against advertising spams. The Internet should be a pure and wholesome place for everybody, free of spams.


