Since the late 1970's, 146.225MHz on the 2 Metre band has been the meeting place for GGREC members. Technically it is just a measured interval of a travelling wave. This worked really well from many places – especially the video linking, and saved a lot of money. The weather there was really hot and humid, mostly between 36° and 38°. But I did get some cycling in for 15km around a lake in Hangzhou. This is a big town that had the population of Melbourne around the 10th century.

While years of manipulating pliers and soldering irons bode well, when it came to pursuing rice, noodles and undefined bean-shaped things around the interior of a food bowl with a couple of wooden sticks, I must confess that I really did enjoy that kangaroo steak I consumed upon my return. Perhaps I was over-compensating, but I don't care!

"THE CLUB HAS PURCHASED A 16mm MOVIE PROJECTOR AND HOPES TO SCREEN REGULAR TECHNICAL FILMS AT MEETINGS AND CLASSES. The projector, an RCA Hollywood model which was purchased second hand is a professional quality "large screen" model and will be ideal for our club rooms. It is currently being overhauled and cleaned by John VK3EW who has had much experience with this particular model". Cont'd from page 1 SHANE CLAYTON ADDRESSES THE JULY MEETING as well as receive power from the grid. This allows customers to 'top up' if they have to, or feed back excess power to the grid if they make too much. Shane said Melbourne gets enough solar energy-average 6-7 hours a day compared to Germany's 2 which is still deemed sufficient for a workable solar system. Cost for a medium house, north-facing and unshaded roof is around \$16,000 of which you get back \$8000 if done by a gualified installer and your combined income is less than \$150,000. (If a not so perfect roof, to get the same bang you'll need more panels, and these are where the real cost lies.) Meantime a campaign is underway to get the cap lifted. After all who has \$16,000—\$20,000 spare cash floating around for such an item especially given it still takes 10-15 years to break even. The audience was able to quote at least one large landholder who has already gone solar and invested in \$50,000 worth of batteries to store the excess generated solar electricity, not exactly your ordinary family's ballpark energy aspiration. Shane's enthusiasm about the potential was contagious and our president says he is already thinking seriously [see President 's Message page 6]. Susan Coleman VK3FXXX.

When our highly esteemed editor, Susan VK3FXXX,asked me to recall some of my memories relating to radio, I had to start at 1948...... It was in that year that the family's 4-valve mantle radio set was replaced by a 5-valve dual wave table model!

This brown bakelite beauty had a dial that not only had all the Australian and New Zealand broadcast stations marked but also a short wave band marked in metres and megacycles as well for far away places like London, Berlin, Moscow, to name a few.

Many happy hours were spent tuning around these bands but the part that really captured my interest was around 40 metres, marked "Amateur Band" I soon discovered more amateurs around 20 metres although it was not marked as such.

In addition to my listening activities I would frequent the local newsagent to pick up the latest edition of *Radio and Hobbies*, and built crystal sets, and later, I- and 2-valve radios.

<u>When I turned 14, I became the proud owner of an AR8 receiver</u>. These receivers were quite plentiful on the disposals market after seeing service during the war in Catalina flying boats, among others.

In 1954 the WIA Victorian Division started a Short Wave Listeners Group. What a big event it was to travel to the WIA rooms at 191 Queen Street Melbourne for the SWL group monthly meetings.

<u>If we were lucky, an amateur would turn up and open the transmitter room and VK3WI would go on the air.</u> Around this time I got to know quite a number of amateurs, including Ron Fisher VK3OM, Stan Dixon VK3TE (sk) and Ted Jenkins VK3QK (sk). Ted lived in St. Kilda Street, opposite Elsternwick Park and I would often visit him after cricket practice.

Apart from radio I also had an interest in audio and built a push-pull 6V6 amplifier and this, with the addition of a bias oscillator and Byer tape deck became the basis of a tape recorder.

Around this time I was working for Stewart McLean in Gardenvale, who was in the public address business. Stewart had the calisign VK3GK but was not active at the time.

In a few years time other interests such as motor racing started to take over from radio and I found myself employed in the motor trade. My interest in radio was however not far from the surface as in 1976 I purchased a Realistic DX160 receiver.

What a change had come over the amateur bands! In my younger days AM was the main mode and it was very rare to hear an SSB signal; now the reverse was the situation.

<u>I then decided it was about time to do what I should have done years ago: sit</u> <u>the exam and get a licence</u>. I rejoined the WIA, joined the Eastern and Mountain District Radio Club, and had a crack at the next AOCP exam.

<u>Unfortunately I just missed out, but was successful at the next Novice exam and was on the air in February 1978</u> with the call VK3NIO and a second-hand Swan 500 coupled to a G5RV antenna.

A couple of months later I managed to pass the full call theory and for some time had the call VK3YTO as well as VK3NIO. *Cont'd over*

As the sunspot cycle was very favourable at the time, I was kept busy working DX, at first with the G5RV and then a little later with 15 and 10 metre Swiss Quads, on top of a small

tower that I made from screw conduit. Six metres was also providing a lot of fun and on one memorable day, I managed to work 2 stations in Texas, with my 4 element Yagi.

About 14 years ago my XYL Naree and I moved from Moorabbin to Warneet and joined GGREC. Eventually an antenna system evolved at the Warneet QTH. The system now comprises a duo band vertical for 2 & 70 FM, 13 element yagi for 70cm, *5* element yagi for 2 metres, 3 element yagi for 6 metres, 2 element tri bander for 20,15 and 10 metres, a half wave dipole for 40, and a 130 foot inverted L for 160 and 80 metres.

<u>I would have to say as a versatile and efficient multi-mode multi-band radio is</u> <u>concerned, my Yaesu 847 driving an FL2100Z on HF would be hard to beat</u>. However when it comes to the true spirit and enjoyment of amateur radio; nothing can compare with using an all-valve, home brew, AM transmitter in conjunction with a 1940 model RCA AR88 receiver, on 160 metres.

As the antenna that I first used to legally radiate RF with was a G5RV, I always have a soft spot for these; especially as in 1989, 1 had the pleasure of working Lou Varney G5RV himself and have a QSL card on the wall to prove it.

At the present time I am not as active in amateur radio as I would like, due to other commitments. Soon I hope to be again looking for DX on the low bands as well as 6 metres. *Mike Ide VK3KTO*

CONVENTIONS FOR DONATING OR SELLING ITEMS TO GGREC

GGREC Committee would like the members to accept the following new guidelines in reference to items donated or sold to the Club. Discussion will take place at the August General Meeting.

The Club Shack has limited space for equipment storage, so we must take care to ensure that items donated to the Club have a practical use and a place to put them.

Additionally by our "Rules of Association", items accepted by the Club cannot be disposed of without membership consent, so unsolicited items of low value cannot simply be discarded. For these reasons the club now has the following policy, governing the acceptance of donations of material items.

All items donated to the Club must be done so unconditionally. This means that is it is at the discretion of the Club members as to how donated items are used, stored, loaned to members, on-sold or discarded.

- Before an item can be 'donated' it must first be accepted by any two committee members on the basis of its value to the Club. Unsolicited items left with the Club may be returned, or even discarded if they have not been formally accepted.
- All accepted items require a note of endorsement by the donor so that we have proof of origin of the items, which are then entered into the register of Club assets unless the item is for resale as stock.

(The Club has a standard "Donation / Sale" form which can assist with this step)

These are practical guidelines to ensure that the Club can continue to enjoy the use of equipment kindly donated to it, without the burden of having to deal with unwanted items. *GGREC Committee*

The GGREC Committee has now formalized some guidelines to clear up any misunderstanding about booking fees paid by members to reserve a position at a Club organized event. Please take note for future events.

CONVENTIONS FOR RESERVED MEALS AND EVENTS WITH GGREC

From time to time the Club organizes an event at a venue where firm bookings are important. At a large restaurant venue for example, seats and tables must be laid out for exact numbers and it becomes an embarrassment to the organizers if many seats are empty on the night, or the opposite where more people show up than there are seats available.

Where the committee believes that exact numbers are important for an event, a standard set of **Reservation Rules** will apply to the occasion. Plenty of notice will be given for the event along with a declaration that the reservation rules will apply. These are intended to extract a firm commitment from persons wishing to attend, and to circumvent any unpleasantness on the day.

- ἀ Where the statement *Reservation rules will apply* is made about a Club event, either from a meeting night or as an item in the Club magazine, then all persons wishing to attend must provide a deposit amount to the Club Treasurer (usually \$5) for every person wishing to participate.
- ἀ Unless prior arrangements have been made, no other person in the Club should accept deposit monies. This allows the Treasurer to be fully aware of exact participant numbers.
- à This deposit may simply be held and later returned to all those who attend. There may be some occasions where this amount will be forwarded to the event vendor and the deposit value will be deducted from each person's bill as they pay. Advance notice will be given should this situation occur for a special event.
- à If a deposit has been paid, but it is not possible to attend, notice should be given to the booking coordinator as soon as possible. If reasonable advance notice of non-attendance is given, and this change does not incur a cost to the Club, the deposit will be refunded. Where the 'non-attendance without notice' is a result of extreme circumstances, the Committee may provide a refund of deposit money, entirely at its discretion.
- ἀ If no prior notice of event non-attendance has been given to the booking person, the deposit money will be lost. This will occur regardless of whether the deposit is lost to a vendor or if the monies have been placed in the Club account.
- $\dot{\alpha}$ If **Reservation Rules** have been applied to an event and **no deposit** has been paid by a person, then that person may **not attend** the event as they may displace someone else who had made a proper reservation.
- $\dot{\alpha}$ Transfer of deposits is allowable as long as prior notice has been given to the booking person.

These simple rules have been provided to ensure the smooth execution of all important Club events. They should remove the potential for bad feelings and uncertainty at a time when a good time is intended to be had by all. *GGREC Committee*
