Scholarships aimed at radio amateurs

The non-profit Foundation for Amateur Radio is now accepting applications for 48 scholarships for the academic year 2009-2010 to assist radio amateurs pursuing higher education. FAR fully funds two scholarships and administers 46 others without cost, on behalf of various club and individual donors. Amateur Radio licensees pursuing a full-time course of study beyond high school and accepted by or enrolled in an accredited university, college or technical school are eligible to apply. Scholarship grants range from \$500 to \$5000, and preference in some cases goes to applicants living in particular geographical areas or pursuing certain studies. <u>Non-US residents are eligible to apply for some of the scholarships</u>. FAR encourages clubs -- -- to announce these scholarship opportunities at meetings, in newsletters, during training classes, on nets and on their websites. More information and an application form may be requested by letter via <u>e-mail</u> or by sending a QSL card postmarked prior to March 30, 2009, to FAR Scholarships, PO Box 831, Riverdale, MD 20738. I didn't know anything about radio or electronics before I met Ian. <u>I</u> was working as a sales assistant in a men's wear shop when we met. Ian taught me to solder. I enjoy soldering, and I have been soldering for Alian Electronics ever since.

<u>I sat for my first novice theory exam in 1998</u>. Peter and Pat Pavey were conducting the exams at their home in Tooradin. I passed on my second attempt. My call sign was VK3HDI. I was very exited. My first contact on 2 metres was to Albert VK3BQO. Next, in 2001, I did the 5 words per minute Morse code exam. That elevated me from Novice Limited, to Novice. My new call sign was VK3NDI. Then in 2003, after about 5 attempts, I finally passed my full theory exam. At the time, it entitled me to have a Limited (now called Advanced) call sign, which I still have, VK3JDI.

I met lan in 1982 and he took me to all the committee meetings and general meetings at the GGRC, then based in Dandenong at a Scout hall. It wasn't until 1989 that the GGREC allowed the wives to join as family members! So although I had been attending meetings *Cont'd over*
