

TOPIC: My Babbage Difference Engine No 1.

Graham Jost has impressed the Meccano world over and over again with his ability to interpret and model the most complex mechanisms in Meccano. I have seen his clocks, knitting looms and novelty devices but his working Babbage Difference engine is a mechanical masterpiece, even more so because the original, designed by Charles Babbage, despite enormous effort and cost, was never actually completed.



If you're male and over 40, there is a good chance you had a Meccano outfit as a child in one form or another be it genuine Meccano or similar compatible system such as Ezybuilt or Buzz Builder. Most of the Meccano that came to Australia was manufactured in England at the Binns Road factory in Liverpool. There was also a factory in France that manufactured Meccano for a few years after the English factory closed in 1979.

During its peak Meccano also made Hornby Dublo trains, Hornby speed boats & Dinky toys.

For most boys this hobby started with a small basic set as a Birthday or Christmas present that could grow (provided you had wealthy parents) with a seemingly endless range of extra parts and accessories such as conversion kits to take your outfit up to the next level set, a range of clockwork and electric motors, a steam engine, gear mechanism sets and electromechanical sets to name a few.

Meccano was created by Frank Hornby who in 1901 took out a patent for a constructional toy he called Mechanics Made Easy which later evolved into the famous Meccano system we know today. During my childhood the Meccano range started with outfit No 1 consisting of only a few basic parts in a cardboard box. At the other end of the spectrum was the prestigious No 10 outfit in a four drawer oak cabinet with enough parts to make some very detailed and complex models. The price of the last French-made No 10 set in 1991 was around \$2500.

There was the fabulous Meccano magazine that ran from 1916 to 1981. This was

an engineering journal that showcased major engineering achievements from all over the world. At its peak it came out monthly with regular articles on the latest aircraft, trains and cars as well as general topics of interest including science and nature. On the front cover would be a magnificent colour photograph of the featured article for that month.



As a note of interest, all volumes of Meccano magazine are available as a PDF on the following website and if you are remotely interested it is well worth a look. Thanks go out to Tim Edwards for putting it together. See http://www.meccanoindex.co.uk/ Today the Meccano name is owned by a Japanese company called Nikko which will hopefully manufacture Meccano for many years to come.
